## TC Alumni Spotlight – Michael Chartier

## On Autonomy and Japanese in Dusseldorf, Germany

Tell us about yourself and your work, describing your path since graduating TC? I'm now married with two children. Since 2011 I've been living and working in Germany. My first year at the International School of Dusseldorf I was a 3rd grade teacher, but I now teach middle school social studies and senior school economics.

Although I don't teach language acquisition courses per se, I have many EAL (English as an additional language) students and what I learned at TC informs what I do. In addition, TC's practicum courses helped me to more effectively lead a class. I've also been able to share what I learned in the TESOL program, as for example by running a vocabulary acquisition workshop for teachers.

Last year I received a stipend from my school to investigate formative assessment. The experience of writing a literature review was useful as I knew the value of reading journal articles. It is my goal to start a part-time PhD program in a few years (while I continue teaching), but I need to wait until my kids are older.

What is your favorite thing about Dusseldorf? Dusseldorf has one of the largest Japanese communities in Europe, so I have many Japanese students. Downtown there is a Little Tokyo which is populated by Japanese families and German cosplay enthusiasts.

What is a favorite memory from TC? A favorite memory is studying with classmates either at their place or a cafe.

What class/teacher/classmate has had a lasting effect on you? Dr. Hruska put me on a path to better classroom management.

What is your favorite thing about your current job? The hardest thing? My favorite thing is having the autonomy is plan lessons as I would like. The hardest thing is that my philosophy of education differs from that of some administrators and colleagues.

What has been the biggest challenge in your career? How did you overcome it? My biggest challenge has been to improve students' learning. It's very much a work in progress.

How did you end up in Japan? While working at a Japanese bank in Chicago, I became interested in Japanese language and culture. I later moved to a US bank but continued to study Japanese (at a Buddhist temple in Chicago). In 2000, I joined the JET Programme as an ALT. I learned that I loved teaching more than banking and returned to Chicago to get my teaching certification.

What would you do if you could take a one-year sabbatical? I would start a PhD program or get to all those unread books on my shelf.

What message would you like to share with the TC community? I miss my old classmates and professors and wish everyone all the best.
